

Happy New Year!

We are extremely grateful for your ongoing support. Rising food and housing costs are bringing more families to us each week.

2019 St. James Food Basket Service Statistics:

- averaged 205 families, or 726 people, receiving food weekly (up from 2017 & 2018)
- distributed 336 Walmart \$10 gift cards to families with children, 17 years or younger
- distributed feminine hygiene products once a month, costing \$4,700
- received approx. 280,000 pounds of food from Daily Bread Food Bank (up from 2018), including more dairy and fresh produce
- received approx. 98,000 pounds of food from Second Harvest (down 10% from 2018)

In 2020 we will again invite local politicians to visit us and see the need in our community. The high cost of rental housing, barriers to accessing subsidized housing and high unemployment levels leave families struggling. In our service area, 17% of children are living in poverty, according to the 2018 Toronto Child & Family Poverty Report published by Social Planning Toronto. The highest rates of poverty are in racialized and newcomer families.

We are experiencing the report's findings first hand; newcomers to Canada are a large group who receive food from us. Whether they are attending English classes, career training or starting a new job, access to food is crucial for their new life here. Your donated funds have helped us provide culturally appropriate food, guided by a questionnaire we administered this year.

We also connect newcomers to services in our community: job searches and networking, resume writing, social groups, services for teens, and so on. Many newcomers take the opportunity to volunteer with us. In this way, they are able to enhance their English and leadership skills and build social connections, while we benefit from their donated time. Since the Food Basket runs entirely by volunteers - this year, 135 volunteers working over 350 hours of effort each week, engaged in unloading delivery trucks, food preparation and distribution, cleaning and administration - we are grateful to have a positive, mutually beneficial relationship with our newcomer population.
