

Happy New Year!

The pandemic impacted our activities again this past year. Thanks to your ongoing support and our dedicated volunteers, we were able to maintain our services with little disruption as the number of families grew.

As outlined in our July 2022 mid-year report, the trend of increased numbers of food recipients needing help each week has continued. We have averaged more than 10 new families each week since June 2022 with most being Ukrainian refugees and new local families who have never accessed a food bank before, or not recently. The rising cost of food makes families more vulnerable and also increases our spending and Daily Bread's spending. Since the end of November, we have served over 300 families each week.

2022 St. James Food Basket Service Statistics:

- Provided food for 32,275 individuals (30% are younger than 16)
- Distributed 377 Walmart \$25 gift cards to children <18 and 146 to families without children
- Received approx. 225,000 pounds of food from Daily Bread Food Bank, and over 65,000 pounds of food from Second Harvest
- Distributed feminine hygiene products, incontinence products for adults and diapers for young children once a month.

2022 St. James Food Basket Spending:

Again, this year Daily Bread gave us a grant to spend on our needs. We used it to buy new, faster laptops and a tablet for registration and translation; two new sturdy tables; an outdoor bench; automated the main door into the Food Basket hall; and repaired our walk-in fridge. The majority of the funds from Daily Bread were used to purchase a wide variety and more expensive range of household products and toiletries for families, including aluminum foil, bandaids, scotch tape, sunscreen, sandwich bags, toothpaste, deodorant, lotion, pens, razors and sanitizing wipes.
